Street Animals Feeding Campaign Continues

The lockdown due to the second wave of COVID19 pandemic in Nepal started on 19 April 2021 and since that day, "Team Sneha's Care" began feeding street animals in Kathmandu Valley. There are an estimated 30000 dogs in Kathmandu valley, 2000 monkeys, and 1000 around stray cows/calves in Kathmandu valley that need to struggle for daily food. We have been feeding around 1200 dogs, 500 monkeys, and 100 stray cows/calves every day on the street of Kathmandu. Animals were fed nutrient-rich food that was cooked in our premises in Lalitpur and was taken for distribution by our volunteers. As the government of Nepal lifted the lockdown, Sneha's Care paused the feeding program on 26 June 2021 until the next notice.

COVID-19 has killed thousands of people daily around the world and millions of people are under treatment. Since the lockdown began in Kathmandu, thousands of wage-based workers are jobless and struggling for daily food. Sneha's Care distributed a vegan food package to 150 needy people in Pashupati and Mahankal area on 26 June 2021. We believe promoting vegan food among poor people will create a positive impact on society.

Field Treatment and Rescue

We have been carrying out field treatments for injured animals since the very beginning of our inception. In this month of June, we treated 147 street dogs in Lalitpur and Kathmandu. From the field, 14 critically injured animals were brought to the shelter where they are cared for, looked after until the animals recovered, and released to the area where they are rescued. Some of the dogs are already released and some are remaining and will be released once they're healthy, some will be adopted while some will remain in the shelter for long-term care. Apart from the field treatments, we have been carrying out daily treatments and feeding for over 179 dogs, 28 cows, 9 pigs, and 7 goats on a daily basis placed at the shelter after the rescue.

As many of you know that Sneha's Care is currently operating two animals shelters (Dog shelter and Farm animal shelter). There are 179 dogs in

The way out of the overgrowing population of strays is the sterilization of street dogs. Sterilization mainly involves the spaying of females and the castration of male dogs so that they do not reproduce. After sterilization, the dogs do not reproduce and hence their population becomes stable. This month we were able to sterilize 32 dogs of the Lalitpur area, 11 more than the previous month.



Like last month, this month our **BAN LIVE ANIMALS TRANSPORTATION** Campaign activities were not carried on the full. This is because due to lockdown no animals were transported from the Terai region to Kathmandu. As we conducted just 02 investigations in two entry ports of Kathmandu Valley in the last week of June, no transporters were identified. Like last month, this month was a relief for the animals as they didn't have to suffer from transportation.

From Gongabu Bus Park to Germany



"Stoner" a stray dog, was brought to our shelter with back left leg badly injured. She was under the intense care of our team for more than a month. Our Sneha's Care Germany Founder **Daniela Zysk** fell in love with Stoner during her visit to Nepal and decided to take her to Germany. Finally, with the daily care, treatment, and love Stoner became fully recovered and flew to Germany on 22 June and currently, she is living like a princess in Germany.
