


HARMONY

Imagine this...

You've spent your whole life devoted to a family, loving them unconditionally. But one day, as age catches up with you, they decide you're no longer worth keeping. You're abandoned on the streets alone, confused, and struggling to survive.

Then, tragedy strikes. A car hits you, breaking your leg. The world moves on, but you're left in unbearable pain, wondering why the love you gave wasn't enough.

This is Cariad's unfortunate story.

But now is under our care, we are trying to restore her broken soul.

She deserves a second chance. Every soul does.



We used to see Bhanu every day, wagging his tail and looking at us with his curious eyes. But one day, we received a distressing call about a hit-and-run accident in Bhanjyang. We rushed to the scene and were devastated to find Bhanu lying helpless, covered in blood. We immediately brought him to the shelter for urgent treatment, but his condition remains critical. We're doing everything we can to help him recover, and we're hoping for a miracle with your support.



She was brought to us by her kind community caretakers after being viciously hit by a vehicle. They brought her to our shelter for immediate OPD treatment, but upon seeing her protruding bone, it was clear that she couldn't be treated on the spot. She required long-term care and healing, so we decided to provide her with the support she needed. The informers promised to return for her once she's fully recovered. She's now healing well under our care.



On February 27th, our team at Sneha's Care rescued Jurgen, a buffalo who endured unimaginable cruelty. Struck on the head with a hammer, he ran through the streets in unbearable pain and fear, lashing out in confusion before collapsing, unconscious and wounded.

Despite our shelter being at full capacity, we made space for him. He is now under intensive care, receiving medical attention and the compassion he deserves.

While his physical wounds will heal, the emotional scars will take time. No animal should suffer such cruelty, and we remain committed to providing safety and love to those in need.














Esteemed Guest

HEARTBREAKING CASE!



Two innocent puppies, who had just opened their eyes to the world, were slowly learning to survive. They loved to play, as recalled by the kind man who fed them every morning on his way to work.

But one day, a cruel person poisoned them both. The man found them lying on the ground, struggling to breathe. In a desperate attempt to save them, he rushed to our shelter on his bike, carrying them in his bag. They were so small, and the poison had already spread through their fragile bodies. Despite our best efforts, we couldn't save them.

This is heartbreaking.

This is cruelty.

There were no CCTV cameras to catch the person who did this.

At times like these, we can't help but feel that we have failed as humans.



RABIES CASE

Here's what a typical rabies suspected case gets reported to Sneha's Care

DOG SHOWING RABIES LIKE SYMPTOMS

Most rabid positive dogs show symptoms of aggression and excessive drooling and/or foaming. This is after the initial symptoms of fever, decreased energy and appetite, dilated pupils which usually goes unnoticed in community dogs.





LOCALS INFORM CONCERNED GOVERNMENT AND US

We often receive calls from ward officials and locals reporting "aggressive" or "rabid" dogs in their area. These reports typically come after someone has been bitten by the dog.

RESCUE AND ISOLATION

Our specialized team goes to the location with all personal protective equipment and dog catching tools.

Unfortunately, there is no cure for rabies. That's also one of the main reasons why we put so much effort into our Anti-Rabies vaccination campaigns.

In the month of February, we successfully spayed 6 female dogs and castrated 6 male dogs, contributing to our ongoing efforts in ethically controlling the dog population.

NEWIE

Rescue reason: Got electrocuted

Newie lost her lower limbs to muscle necrosis, but that hasn't dimmed her spirit. She remains the most playful cat, enjoying sunbathing, pawing at passerby's, and spreading joy. Now, she's searching for a loving home where she can thrive.

BLACKPEA

Rescue reason: Termed aggressive

Blackpea has been a wonderful boy since arriving at Sneha's Care. He loves going on walks and is full of energy. One of our volunteers fell in love with him and hoped to take him to Germany, but unfortunately, she had to drop the plan due to unforeseen circumstances.



KHAIRU

Rescue reason: Rabies Suspected

We lost Khairu a few days after his rescue. Following his passing, we took him to the Hospital for a post-mortem, where he tested positive for rabies. We then laid him to rest with respect and promptly informed the concerned ward officials and informers to ensure post-exposure rabies vaccinations were administered.

NANO/CHARLIE

Rescue reason: Protruding eyes

After discovering that Nano is suffering from Canine Transmissible Venereal Tumor (CTVT), he received his first dose of chemotherapy. He is currently under medication and supplementary treatment to support his recovery. Despite his condition, Nano remains strong and is responding well to the care provided.



SCURFY



Scurfy came to Sneha's Care suffering from a skin infection, severely dehydrated, and weak. Despite his struggles, he quickly became the closest to everyone's heart. Unfortunately, Scurfy has now crossed the rainbow bridge. We are grateful for the time we had with him and hope we were able to give him all the love he deserved in his final days. He will always be remembered with fondness.

THE TRAGIC END OF MAKUNA

A CALL FOR JUSTICE

A CALL FOR CHANGE

Makuna, a beloved wild elephant from the Sauraha area of Chitwan, met a heartbreaking end at the hands of a park security guard. The incident has raised serious concerns about the safety measures in place for wildlife protection and the growing conflicts between human settlements and wild animals.

The incident occurred when Makuna, who had wandered into a residential area, was shot while efforts were being made to drive it away from human settlements. However, the question remains: did Makuna enter our land, or have we encroached upon his? As human expansion continues to invade natural habitats, such tragedies become increasingly inevitable. We must ask ourselves—what are we doing to prevent these encounters, and what more can be done to protect wildlife from such unjust deaths?



We cannot allow Makuna's death to be seen as just another statistic. This tragic event highlights the urgent need for better conflict mitigation strategies to ensure that such violence is not the first response when human-wildlife interactions occur. We must understand that animals like Makuna are not intruders in our territory; it is us who continue to take over their homes.

PROTEST FOR JUSTICE

In partnership with Federation of Animal Welfare of Nepal (FAWN), we held a protest at the Department of National Parks and Wildlife Conservation, urging the authorities to take immediate action and implement effective measures that prevent such incidents from recurring in the future. If the authorities fail to respond adequately, we will be compelled to escalate our efforts and continue fighting for the rights and protection of these innocent beings.

We also want to emphasize that Makuna's death is not an isolated event; there is a pattern of such killings occurring across the country, and we cannot afford to ignore this growing crisis any longer. Innocent animals, unable to defend themselves, continue to be victims of human aggression and neglect.

We urge the government and responsible authorities to act with awareness and urgency, and to put an end to the cruelty that continues to plague wildlife in Nepal. The death of Makuna should not be in vain—it must serve as a reminder that we must all take responsibility for protecting these vulnerable creatures and finding humane solutions to human-wildlife conflicts.













STRENGTHENING ANIMAL WELFARE IN NEPAL

Animal welfare in Nepal faces many challenges due to weak legal protections, but Sneha's Care actively advocates for stronger policies, including a comprehensive Animal Welfare Act, by pressuring the government, organizing workshops, and collaborating with key stakeholders to promote animal rights and well-being.

We are strongly advocating for a more inclusive bill and to support this, we have conducted several workshops.




Meeting with Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock Development

Nepal urgently needs an Animal Welfare Act, and this month we met with the Honorable Minister of Agriculture and Livestock Development, Ramnath Adhikari, to discuss this. We requested the speedy finalization of the Animal Welfare Bill, which is currently under review at the Ministry of Law, Justice, and Parliamentary Affairs.

The Ministers positive words and his commitment towards animal welfare brings us hope that the Animal Welfare Movement is making real progress.

We sincerely thank Honorable Minister Ramnath Adhikari for his support and believe that the long-awaited Animal Welfare Act will soon become a reality.










OUR YEARS OF WORK IS FINALLY COMING TO ACTION
